<p><u>Sidewalk Chalk Art</u> Draw your best pictures on your driveway and sidewalk.</p>	<p><u>Shoe Rubbing:</u> Get a paper and several colors of crayons. Do a texture rub of several shoes in your hose. A different color for each shoe tread. Which tread pattern do you like the best?</p>	<p><u>Random Act of Art:</u> Find a rock, wash it off. Paint it nice a bright. Write a one-word positive message on the rock. Go for a walk and leave it somewhere for someone to find.</p>
<p><u>Cerealscapes:</u> You will need construction paper, a crayon, glue and dry cereal like Cherrios. On the construction paper use the crayon to draw and outline of a nature scene. Estimate how many pieces of cereal you will need to cover the outline. Glue cereal pieces on picture outline. Count total number used.</p>	<p><u>Pastry Chef Competition:</u> Have your family decorate either cupcakes or sugar cookies. Pick who did the best job.</p>	<p><u>Paper Bag Puppets:</u> Use paper lunch sacks, design them as puppets. Make up a story and put on a puppet show for your family, or have your puppets lip sync to your favorite song.</p>
<p><u>Water Art</u> Use a squeeze bottle, fill it with water. Outside on the concrete, squeeze the bottle to draw designs with the water.</p>	<p><u>Potato Stamp Carving.</u> Have a parent cut a potato in $\frac{1}{2}$. On one side your parent can carve a square and on the other side a triangle. Dip potato stamp in paint. What patterns can you make on your paper using the 2 shapes?</p>	<p><u>Polyhedron Sculptures:</u> Polyhedron: a solid figure with many plane faces, typically more than 6. Use mini marshmallows (or clay) and lots of toothpicks to build polyhedrons. On a sheet of paper draw each shape and record their features. Number of: faces, edges and vertices.</p>
