Draw 8 circles on a sheet of paper. Use a circle template such as a jar, a cup or a lid. Turn each circle into a picture. Ex: a smiley face, donut, flower, etc. Color each picture.

Warm colors: red,
orange and yellow.
Cool colors: green,
blue and purple.
Make a drawing of
snowmen coloring
them with warm and
cool colors.

Texture is how something feels. A sidewalk is rough, a bunny is soft and pudding is mushy. Find ten different textures around your house. Make a list of your 10 objects and their textures. Try to make a texture rubbing by putting a piece of paper over your object and rub the side of a peeled crayon over it.

Mixing colors. Our primary colors are red, yellow and blue. Use watercolors, markers, or crayons to mix the primary colors. Just using those 3 colors, what new colors can you make?

Pretend you are swimming at the bottom of the ocean. You're wearing goggles. Draw the outline of your goggles nice and big. Inside the goggles draw the fish and other creatures you see. Ex: An octopus, shark, star fish, etc. Color your picture.

Rainbow scavenger hunt. Find an object in your house for each color. Line up the objects in rainbow order: red, orange, yellow, green, blue, and purple. Take a picture and e-mail it to your teacher.

Origami is the Japanese art of Folding paper into a decorative shape or figure. Grab some paper and see what you can fold. I know you can all fold a fan and maybe a boat.
